**Each of today's clinicians are inductees into the MBHOF. They bring a wealth of knowledge and experience.**

**Max Good** - A native of Gardiner, Maine, Coach Good brings 55 years of experience to our clinic. He started his career as a high school coach in Richmond, Kentucky and ascended to head college positions at Eastern Kentucky, Bryant U, UNLV, and Loyola Marymount. He had a stop back in his home state at MCI, where he led the Preppers to 5 New England Prep School Titles in 10 seasons.

**Mike Adams** - In 25 seasons at Edward Little HS, Coach Adams has compiled over 300 wins as well as two Class AA State Titles. A native of Farmington, Mike was the first ever recipient of Maine's "Mr. Basketball" after his senior season at Mt. Blue. He continued his career at Thomas College where he is enshrined in the school's Hall of Fame.

**Tony Hamlin** - After 31 seasons and over 400 victories, Coach Hamlin retired from his alma Penquis Valley High School in Milo as one of the state's all time great coaches. He led the Patriots to two State Titles in 17 seasons He also coached at MCI, Morse High School, and South Portland High School where the Red Riots won a two regional titles as well as the 1983 Gold Ball.

**Julie Veilleux Sinclair** - A grad of Cony High, Julie continued her career at the University of Maine where she helped lead the Black Bears to the 2004 America East Championship and a berth in the NCAA tournament. She was an asst at Bowdoin College for three years, and the United States Naval Academy for four seasons. Julie then became the head coach for Colby College from 2011-2016.

**Warren Caruso** - the head coach for the Husson men's basketball program since 1999 he has led the Eagles to 15 conference championships and 15 NAIA/NCAA National Tournament appearances. He has a career record of 548-255. He is the winningest coach in North Atlantic Conference history, and has served 36 years as both a head and assistant coach for the Eagles.

**Adrienne Shibles** - The Mt. View graduate carved out a legendary women's basketball coaching career of 29 years. After 9 years at Swarthmore (PA) College, she led Bowdoin to the most career wins in program history (281-67) while recording two NESCAC titles, 11 NCAA Tournament appearances, and back-to-back NCAA Division III title game appearances (2018-19). Coach Shibles capped her coaching career serving two seasons (2021-23) at the helm for Division I Dartmouth College.
